Our unit plan for high school students provides the curricular framework and guidance to achieve experiential learning outcomes in public history education. Students benefit from:

- ✓ conducting primary source research

- ✓ obtaining a Pomeroy Marker to highlight local history

The Benefits of Making Community History Part of Your Curriculum

Educators receive a free, 3-week unit plan with 15 lessons. The Pomeroy Foundation provides personalized guidance to support students and teachers.

Students explore the importance of public history and civic literacy by researching local historic sites. They develop skills in primary source research and historical writing. They complete a grant application requesting financial support for a Pomeroy Marker.



Week 1: Introduction to public history, primary source research, bibliography creation



Week 2: Historic site research, documentation gathering, and application preparation



Week 3: Application finalization, commemorative event planning to promote local history and earn news coverage


